From the President

The people of Sudbury seem to have a tradition of enjoying research. Some people are able to do it and others form an appreciative audience. Excellence and thoroughness have characterized the unique presentations at Historical Society meetings. The Society serves the community well by locating and by doing original historical research and by providing a forum for presentation.

Original research about Sudbury has been presented at the winter programs. The Program "Slavery in Sudbury?" explored a subject little known and quite surprising. The Ralph Adams Cram program brought to light a world famous architect who had a home in Sudbury but seemed to be better known in Boston than in Sudbury. The "Vision for Route 20" juxtaposed historic old

pictures with a vision for future revitalization of the business corridor. Each of these programs was presented by the person who had actually done the research and who was personally interested in the subject.

Programs are selected in August for the coming year, but suggestions are welcome anytime. Please contact Ursula Lyons or Lee Swanson if you know of any more 'local treasures' who might share their research at future SHS programs or if you have an idea for a future program. Thank you.

January 19 was Ralph Adams Cram Day in Sudbury


Over 400 people braved the cold and the snow to attend the Open House at the newly restored mansion on Concord Rd. named 'Whitehall' by noted American Gothic architect Ralph Adams Cram who spent summers there from 1910 until his death. The current owners of the mansion, Touchstone Realty, Inc., served 'wine and cheese' to all the guests. Local artists displayed their works in several rooms as people went on a self-guided tour. Everyone was pleased with the event and a few days later the floors were once again clean and polished for prospective buyers!

The program co-sponsored by the Friends of the Goodnow Library and the Sudbury Historical Society, "The Sudbury Savant" at the Goodnow Library, had an overflow crowd to hear architect Ethan Anthony's slide/lecture of the life and works of Cram. The Ralph Adams Cram Exhibit in the upstairs Ramp Gallery at the library continues until April 1.st

In **February** a large audience at Town Hall heard Wayland resident Jane Sciacca give a very informative lecture on slavery in Sudbury. She 'named names' and spoke of the lives of the slaves who lived in Sudbury during the Colonial period until slavery was prohibited in Massachusetts in 1783.

The SHS March program, "A Vision for Route 20: How it Was and How it Can Be" was skillfully presented by Sudbury resident Cheryl Salatino, a Radcliffe Landscape Design Program graduate, who has developed a workable plan for transforming the disconnected Route 20 commercial district into a desirable destination for residents, shoppers, visitors and area workers. SHS Curator Lee Swanson aided Cheryl with her visual presentation. We all want to believe that Cheryl's vision will one day become a reality!

Did You Know??? There is a 17th century small pox graveyard located along the '30 rod road' belonging to the Knox Trail Council of the Boy Scouts adjacent to the Town of Sudbury's Tippling Rock Trail. As of 1930 there were six gravestones listing the name and date of death of early Colonial settlers who died from small pox. The gravestones have disappeared although we believe that a nearby house has one of them. Anyone who has any information of the whereabouts of these gravestones should contact the SHS so that we may assist the Boy Scouts in placing the gravestones in a protected display at the site.

Save The Date - June 8 - For A Special Walking Tour Around the Town Centre!!

1850 Friendship Quilt May be Returned to Sudbury


Are you related to anyone who lived in Sudbury during the 1850's? If so, you may be especially interested in knowing more about the status of what appears to be a rare 'find' which will hopefully return to Sudbury.

In 1850 a group of 63 women, mostly from Sudbury, contributed personalized squares to a large pink Friendship Quilt coverlet on both sides which Lucinda Brown assembled. The purpose of the quilt is uncertain but the estate of her great grand-daughter, Mary Thompson Howe, sold the quilt and it was found in a flea market in Mississippi in 1975 by David and Marian Spitzley now living in Grosse Point Park, Michigan. For the last 27 years the Spitzleys have stored the quilt in their home and have done some research on its origins. On February 21, an Internet message came to the Sudbury Historical Society (via the Historical Commission) that the quilt was for sale. Pictures and information related to the various women who contributed to the quilt were also received. Our enthusiasm is growing daily and Trustees are meeting to plan the next steps toward purchasing the quilt. The SHS believes, as do the owners, that the quilt should be returned to Sudbury where ALL residents may view the 63 signatures and sentiments which so many Sudbury women wrote. 


