THE BOSTON POST CANE

Sudbury Boston Post Cane Awarded to 104-Year-Old Ruth M. Brown

October marked the revival of a longstanding Sudbury tradition: the Boston Post Cane was awarded to Ruth M. Brown, the town's most senior resident at the age of 104!

A native of western New York, Ruth M. Ray was born in 1920 and later married Joseph "Joe" Brown in 1944. They had five children together and moved to Sudbury in 1959, spending the rest of their seventy-six years of marriage here. Ruth pursued a career in clerical work, initially with the Bell Aircraft Corporation in Rochester, New York, and then for the Town of Sudbury Public Health Nurses Association.

Over the years, Ruth has been a superbly active participant in the local community. She was part of the Sudbury Business and Professional Women Club, Sudbury Woman's Club, the Town of Sudbury 350th Committee, and the Wayside Inn Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, as well as a proud member of the Sudbury Historical Society and the Memorial Congregational Church of Sudbury. After much genealogical research, Ruth was even able to link her ancestors back to Edmund Rice, the founder of Sudbury, which led her to join the Edmund Rice Association.

In 1909, Edwin Grozier (1859-1924)—then owner of the Boston Post newspaper—established the Boston Post Cane prize to honor the oldest inhabitant in towns across Massachusetts. Grozier commissioned Fradley and Company of New York to manufacture the canes, each identical in design. The shafts were made from ebony indigenous to West Africa and the handles were composed of fourteen-carat gold with town names inscribed.

The Sudbury Boston Post Cane was first awarded to William Phelps Jones (1820-1911) in that initial year and the tradition has been awarded on and off throughout the years. Now that the cane is well preserved as part of the Sudbury Historical Society archives, we plan to carry on this tradition for years to come.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR CEMETERY REVISITED

The following is an excerpt from a document written by the late Ed Kreutz in 2022. As a result of his extensive research, the Revolutionary War Cemetery was revisited by members of both the Sudbury Historical Society and the Sudbury Historical Commission. This group has collaborated over the past two years to collect and update information related to the cemetery. These updates will soon be made available to the public, and a new informational kiosk will be installed at the cemetery. The kiosk will provide locations of known burials, list notable individuals interred there, and offer links for those who wish to explore further. We are eternally grateful for Ed's passion for history.

So their names may not be lost to the knowledge of men.

In the summer of 2012, ground penetrating radar brought to light some unknown facts about Sudbury's Revolutionary War Cemetery, located in Sudbury's town center. The scans located 976 possible burial sites and 70 possible buried headstones.

These discoveries prompted research to determine whether there were any Revolutionary War soldiers buried there whose graves have sunk beneath the earth and gone unidentified in modern times. For two and a half centuries, headstones have borne the brunt of New England's freezing and thawing, acid rain, and pollution, rendering many of them unreadable.

After months of research in 2022, names of long-forgotten soldiers emerged. Through exploring historic documents of burials, it was found that 106 Revolutionary soldiers were interred here. Previously, it had been thought that number was only 41. Out of that 106, only 61 of their stones remain today. Lucy Hall Greenlaw mentions in her book, "Inscriptions from the Old Cemetery at Sudbury, Mass" (1906), that some graves are marked by fieldstones and broken headstones and that many aren't marked at all. She also noted that less than half of those buried there are found in the records of the town.

In addition, some records such as the Reverend Jacob Bigelow's log of all those buried there from 1772 until 1816, revealed interments of many who had served in the war without giving the exact location of their sites. Other documentation, such as Lucy Hall Greenlaw's book, also lists the burial of many Revolutionary War soldiers here, again without the knowledge of exactly where in the cemetery.

To date, this recent culmination of documentation is the most exhaustive list of known Revolutionary soldiers buried here, including their families and service records, but more can always be learned. As a community, we must do what we can to preserve the stones we have and through documentation, remember and honor those farmers, shopkeepers, and tradesmen of Sudbury who defied the most powerful nation on earth in the fight for freedom. They reveal many of Sudbury's soldiers of the Revolutionary War long forgotten.



In the year 2025, there are some remarkable books on the horizon.

The initial book is the result of extensive work throughout 2024. Titled 'Enslavement in the Puritan Village,' it is authored by Jane Sciacca. Jane's research on enslavement in Sudbury, including present-day Wayland, spans over 24 years and has now been compiled into a book. Jane collaborated closely with the Sudbury Historical Society to have her book published by History Press, a division of Arcadia Publishing.

This book launched on January 21st and is obtainable for purchase at the 01776 Gift Shop.

We aim to uncover numerous stories and potentially address or debunk some urban legends. The book is scheduled for release in late 2025, followed by an exhibit. Stay tuned for further updates!
