

So Their Names May Not Be Lost to the Knowledge of Men

In the summer of 2012, ground penetrating radar brought to light some unknown facts about the Revolutionary War Cemetery, located in Sudbury Town Center. At the request of the Sudbury Historical Commission, Robert W. Perry of Topographix, LLC, in Hudson, New Hampshire, conducted ground scans and documented his findings in a report dated July 29, 2012. His scans had located 976 possible burial sites and 70 possible buried headstones.

These discoveries prompted research to determine whether there were any Revolutionary War Soldiers buried there whose graves have sunk beneath the earth and gone unidentified in modern times. For two and a half centuries, headstones have borne the brunt of New England's freezing and thawing, acid rain and pollution, rendering many of them unreadable.

After months of research in 2022, names of long forgotten soldiers emerged. Through exploring historic documents of burials, it was found that 104 Revolutionary soldiers were interred here. Previously, it had been thought that number was 41. However, out of that 104, only 61 epitaphs have been found by researching documentation of grave inscriptions. Lucy Hall Greenlaw mentions in her book, *Inscriptions from the Old Cemetery at Sudbury, Mass.* (1906), that some graves are marked by fieldstones and broken headstones and that many are not marked at all. She also noted that less than half of those buried there are found in town records.

In addition, some records such as the Reverend Jacob Bigelow's log of all those buried there from 1772 until 1816, revealed interments of many who had served in the war without giving the exact location of their sites. Other documentation, such as Lucy Hall Greenlaw's book, also lists the burial of many Revolutionary War Soldiers here, again without the knowledge of exactly where in the cemetery.

To date, this recent culmination of documentation is the most exhaustive list of known Revolutionary War Soldiers buried here, including their families and service records, but more can always be learned. As a community, we must do what we can to preserve the stones we have and through documentation, remember and honor those Sudbury farmers, shopkeepers, and tradesmen, who defied the most powerful nation on earth in the fight for freedom. They reveal many of Sudbury soldiers of the Revolutionary War long forgotten.

Balcom, Asahel, Corporal, (6/5/1741-6/19/1815), age 74. He married Jerusha Willis and had two children. His epitaph at one time read, "In Memory of Mr. Asahel Balcom, who died June 19, 1815. AEt. 74". He was in Capt. Aaron Haynes's Co., which marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775, to Cambridge; service, 3 days. He also served in Capt. Asahel Wheeler's Co., Col. Jonathan Read's Regiment. He enlisted Sept. 28, 1777; and was in service, 41 days, with The Northern Army.

Balcom, Jonas, Private, (8/7/1735-9/13/1810), age 76. He married Grace Holden and had 1 child. His epitaph reads, "Erected In memory of Mr. Jonas Balcom, who died Sept. 13, 1810, in the 76 year of his age". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co. and stationed at Hull and then at Fort Independence. He was paid 52 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Bent, Jason, Private, (7/25/1749-10/1/1786), age 37. He married Anna Glover and had 7 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was a Private in Capt. Isaac Locker's Co., Col. James Barrett's Regiment which marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775, to Concord, in service for 3 days. He was paid 66 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Bent, Jonathan, Captain, (4/22/1758-? /? /1826), age 68. He married Experience Smith and had 9 children. He also married Ruth Haynes and had 2 children. His epitaph at one time read, "Jonathan Bent born Apr 22, 1758, died 1826 AEt. 68 yrs. Served at Concord April 19, 1775 in Capt. Smith's Co. At Ticonderoga in 1776 under Capt. Ashahel Wheeler. Was afterward Capt. of Militia". He had 2 months service with Capt. Wheeler's Co., Col. Robinson's Regiment in 1776. He was paid 17 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Bowker, Daniel, Captain, (11/23/1731-1/31/1822), age 92. He married Sarah Brigham and had 4 children. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of Capt. Daniel Bowker who died January 31, 1822. AEt. 92 My flesh shall slumber in the ground, Till the last trumpet's joyful sound, then burst these chains in sweet surprise, And in savior's image rise". He was a Lieutenant in Capt. Aaron Haynes's Co., which marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775, to Cambridge. He was a Captain in Col. Webb's Regiment. He was paid 70 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Brigham, Abijah, Lieutenant, (8/26/1737-4/2/1814), age 76. He married Eunice Willis and had 8 children. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of Lieut. Abijah Brigham, who died April 2, 1814. AEt. 76". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Company. He was paid 41 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Brown, Hope, Corporal, (7/22/1742–4/10/1812), age 70. He married Ruth Hosmer and had 13 children. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Mr. Hope Brown, who died April 10, 1812. AEt. 70. "My children as you are passing by, Stop and behold the place I lye, Make sure Christ which thou delay, That you may rest in peace with me". He enlisted in Capt. Nixon's Minute Co. 3/13/1775, which marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775, from Sudbury via Concord to Cambridge; in service for 3 days. He was paid 55 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Brown, Jotham, Private, (9/17/1708–2/25/1798), age 89. He married Hepzibeth Robbins and had 7 children. His epitaph at one time read, "In memory of Mr. Jotham Brown, who died Feb. 25, 1798, aged 89". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co.. He was paid 26 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Brown, Nathaniel, Private, (8/13/1741–10/8/1798), age 58. He married Elinor Hayden and had 11 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was on the march to Concord April 19, 1775. He went to Saratoga, July 1777 in Col. Brown's Regiment, General Gates' Commander. He was in Capt. Jonathan Rice's Co., Col. Samuel Bullard's regiment and enlisted Aug. 17, 1777. He was discharged Oct. 21, 1777; in service for 4 months, and 14 days with the Northern Army. He was paid 11 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Carr, Thomas Jr. Private, (?/?/1717–4/12/1783), age 66. He married Grace Sharman and had 5 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co. and marched on April 19, 1775. He was paid 48 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Carter, James, Private, (3/12/1724–2/28/1795), age 70. He married Priscilla Whitney and had 5 children. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Mr. James Carter who departed this life February the 28th 1795; AEt. 70". He joined Capt. Wheeler's Co. June 13, 1776, in service to Dec. 1, 1776, 5 months, 9 days. He enlisted in Col. Reed's Regiment Sept. 22, 1777. He was paid 21 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Dakin, Joseph, Private, (3/7/1751–11/28/1802), age 51. He married Elizabeth Brown and had 3 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was at Bunker Hill in Capt. Wheeler's Co.. He was Paid 21 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Dakin, Samuel, Jr. Sargent, (5/17/1731–1/23/1807), age 75. He Married Anna Wheeler and had no children. He then married Mehetable Eaton and had 6 children. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Dea'n Samuel Dakin, who died January 23, 1807. AEt. 75". He was in Capt. Haynes's co., which marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775, to Cambridge via Concord; service, 4 days. He was Paid 25 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Delrimple, Thomas, Captain, (?/?/1735–5/27/1812), He married Mary Fowle and had 2 children. His epitaph is unknown. He marched on April 19, 1775 in Capt. Rice's Co. He enlisted in Capt. Hayward's Co., Col. Thatcher's Regiment, Jan - Feb 1777 and served at Hull. He was then stationed at Fort Independence. He was Captain of Longley's Co., Col. Cogswell's Regiment in 1779. He was paid 27 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service. (*Bigelow has May 1810) verify*

Dun, William, Private, (?/1742–4/25/1777), age 35. He married Eunice Goodnow and had 1 child. His epitaph is unknown. He marched on April 19, 1775, He enlisted for 3 Years in 1777, and was reported deceased while in service.

Fairbank, Jonathan, Corporal. (3/29/1755–2/28/1840), age 85. He married Hannah Morse and had 2 children. He then married Bridget Parmenter and had 10 children. His epitaph reads, "Mr. Jonathan Fairbank, died February 28, 1840, AEt. 85. Weep not my friends; dry up your tears. I must be here till Christ appears, And at his coming hope to have, A glorious rising from the grave". He was in Col. Smith's Co., 6th Regiment for 9 months in 1779.

Gibbs, Asahel, Private, (5/27/1748–6/26/1845), age 97. He married Sarah Howe and had no known children. His epitaph is unknown. He was at Bunker Hill. He enlisted in Capt. Rice's Co., Col. How's 4th Regiment for 3 years. He was paid 75 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Gibbs, Jesse, Corporal, (7/4/1744–7/28/1788), age 44. He married Ruth Howe and had 4 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co. on April 19, 1775. He was paid 48 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Goodenow, Aaron, Private, (4/1/1710–8/25/1788), Age 78. He married Elizabeth, (no known maiden name), and had no known children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co. He was paid 17 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Goodenow, Daniel Sr., Lieutenant, (6/16/1707–5/27/1777), age 69. He married Sara Rice and had 2 children; he then married Ruth Wood and had 8 children. His epitaph reads "Here lies interred the body of Lieut. Daniel Goodenow, who deceased on ye 27th of May; Anno Domini 1777. Aged 69 years & 11 months". He enlisted in Capt. Nixon's Minute Co. 3/13/1775. His Executor was paid 32 Pounds by the town for his war service.

Goodenow, Joseph, Captain, (5/16/1746–9/3/1813), age 68. He married Dinah Moore and had 1 child. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of Capt. Joseph Goodenow, who died September 3, 1813. In the 68 year of his age. Draw near my friends and take a thought, How soon the grave may be your lot, Make sure of Christ while life remain, And death will be eternal gain". He was in Col. Bullard's Regiment. He was paid 19 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Goodnow, Elijah, Private, (3/20/1755–10/21/1790), age 36. He married Abigail Dudley and had 7 children. His epitaph is unknown. He marched on April 19, 1775 and was in Col. Bullard's Regiment. He was in service 3 months, 24 days.

Goodnow, Ephraim, Private, (1/17/1717–6/21/1787), age 70. He married Elizabeth Green and had no known children. He married Mary Holmes and had 1 child. His epitaph is unknown. He was at Bunker Hill and Prospect Hill. He enlisted in 1777 for 3 years in Capt. Rice's Co., Col. How's 4th Regiment. He was paid 20 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Goodnow, John Jr., Private, (1/30/1762–10/13/1863), age 101. He married Persis Howe and had 8 children. His epitaph reads "Erected in memory of Mr. John Goodnow, a soldier of the revolution who died October 13, 1863. AEt. 101 years 8 months & 14 days". He was in Capt. Moulton's Co., Col. How's Regiment for 8 months service in Tiverton, Rhode Island. He was paid 50 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Goodnow, Samuel, Private, (12/15/1733–11/7/1804), age 69. He married Sarah Knight and had 6 children. His epitaph at one time read, "Mr. Samuel Goodnow. Died Nov. 7, 1804, Aet. 69". He was in the 3rd Massachusetts Infantry.

Goodnow, Silas Jr., Private, (4/12/1734–1/17/1809), age 76. He married Mary Boyle and had 1 child. His epitaph is unknown. He was a guard at the government storehouse in Sudbury in 1777. He was paid 40 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Green, Joseph, Private, (5/5/1721–1/22/1791), age 72. He married Patience Winship and had 3 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was at Bunker Hill in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 10 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Hayden, William, Private, (10/18/1731–11/6/1809), age 77. He married Elizabeth Potter and had 6 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 53 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Haynes, Aaron, Captain, (12/25/1727–1/23/1782), age 55. He married Rebecca Willis and had 3 children. His epitaph is unknown. He marched on April 19, 1775. He was at Bunker Hill, and Prospect Hill, and the Ticonderoga Campaign in Col. Whitcomb's Regiment. He was paid 190 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Haynes, Charles, Private, (9/12/1736–10/22/1806), age 70. He married Elizabeth Winn and had no known children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co.. He was paid 73 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Haynes, Israel, Private, (12/11/1726–8/24/1808), age 79. He married Sarah Daby and had 7 children. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of Mr. Israel Haynes, who died August 24, 1808. AEt. 79". He was in Capt. Aaron Haynes' Co., which marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775, to Cambridge, via Concord in service, 3 days. He was paid 113 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Haynes, Joshua, Lieutenant, (12/31/1731–12/29/1814), age 82. He married Rebecca Mead and had 3 children. He then married Susanna Puffer and had 6 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was wounded on April 19, 1775. He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co. at Bunker Hill. He was paid 78 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Haynes, Josiah, Deacon, (7/10/1696–4/19/1775), age 79. He married Persis Knight and had 4 children. His epitaph reads "In memory of Deacon Josiah Haynes who died in Freedoms Cause the 19th of April 1775, in the 79th year of his age. Come listen all unto this call, Which God doth make today, For you must die as well as I, And pass from hence away". He was killed at Lexington. His Executor was paid out of an "Account showing sums of money to be paid from the public treasury to sundry persons for losses sustained at battles of Lexington and Bunker Hill; amounts allowed in Council June 13, 1776; entry credits amount due to heirs of said Haynes."

Holden, Jonas, Private, (1721–7/15/1800), age 79. He married Abigail Kendall and then Molly Thompson. He had 6 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co. on April 19, 1775. He was paid 53 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

How, Ezekiel, Colonel, (4/5/1720–10/15/1796), age 77. He married Bathsheba Stone and had 9 children. His epitaph reads, "Sacred to the memory of Colonel Ezekiel How, who died October 15, 1796 AEtatis 77". He was the Proprietor of what is now known as The Wayside Inn and Commander of the Sudbury Companies of Militia and Minute, and the 4th Regiment. He was also a member of The Committee of Correspondence. He was paid 70 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

How, Samuel, Cornet, (2/12/1726–10/17/1781), age 55. He married Elizabeth Haynes and had 5 children. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of Cornet Samuel How, who died October 17, 1781; AEt. 55". He was in Capt. Rice's Co. He was paid 46 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Howe, David Jr., Lieutenant, (1/7/1756–10/13/1803), age 47. He married Sibbel Rockwood and had 6 children. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of Lieutenant David Howe, who died October 13 AD 1803, in the 47 year of his age. When mortal man resigns his breath And falls a clod of clay The soul immortal wings its flight To never setting day". He marched on April 19, 1775, in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 53 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Howe, Joseph, Lieutenant, (12/1/1760–7/22/1808), age 48. He married Hepsibeth Belknap and had 8 children. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of Lieutenant Joseph Howe, who died July 22, 1808 in the 48 year of his age". He was in Capt. Reeds Co., Col. Brook's Regiment. He enlisted in 1780 until the end of the war.

Hunt, William, Private, (4/3/1726–4/4/1802), age 76. He married Mary Wheeler and had 11 children. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of Mr. William Hunt, who departed this life April 4th, 1802: Aged 76 years". He was in Capt. Rice's Co. He was paid 33 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Jones, Samuel, Private, (3/17/1759–2/20/1833), age 75. He married Rachel Haynes and had 4 children. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Mr. Samuel Jones, who died February 20, 1833. AEt. 75". He was at Bunker Hill and then both the Canada Expedition and the Ticonderoga Campaign.

Knight, Samuel, Captain, (7/12/1710–11/10/1801), age 91. He married Ann Clap and had no known children. He then married Lois Goodenow and had 1 child. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 44 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Langdon, Josiah, Doctor, (3/3/1746–2/24/1779), 32. He married Dorothy Brintnall and had 1 child. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Doctor Josiah Langdon A.M. who died February the 24th, 1779; AEt. 32. Mortuus Vivit". He enlisted in Capt. Nixon's Minute Co. on March 13, 1775. He was paid 12 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Lincoln, Isaac Jr, Private, (7/10/1744–8/25/1825), age 81. He married Experience Willis and had 8 children. His epitaph at one time read, "Isaac Lincoln died August 25, 1825, AEt. 81". He was in Capt. Rice's Co. He was paid 48 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Loring, Nathan, Private, (11/27/1721–4/25/1803), age 81. He married Keziah Woodward and had 3 children. He then married Elizabeth Clapp and had no known children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co.. He was paid 32 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Maynard, Aaron, Private, (10/23/1738–1/28/1796), age 58. He married Mary Lovering and had 4 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co.. He was paid 50 Pounds in 1778 for his war service.

Maynard, Gideon, Private, (9/23/1757–4/25/1813), age 56. He married Lois Carter and had 3 children. His epitaph at one time read, "Erected in Memory of Mr. Gideon Maynard, who died April 25, 1813; AEt. 56". He was in Capt. Asahel Wheeler's Co., Col. Jonathan Read's Regiment and enlisted Sept. 28, 1777. He was in service for 41 days with the Northern Army.

Maynard, Isaac, Private, (10/27/1747–6/25/1797), age 50. He married Rebekah Wheeler Haynes, and had 8 children. His epitaph reads, "Sacred to the memory of Mr. Isaac Maynard who died June 25th 1797; Aetatis 50". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co. He was paid 198 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Maynard, John, Private, (4/20/1721–10/14/1809), age 89. He married Esther Rice and had 6 children. His epitaph reads, "Erected to the memory of Mr. John Maynard, who died October 14, 1809 in the 89 year of his age. Draw near my friend and take a thought, How soon the grave may be your lot, Make sure of Christ while life remain, And death will be eternal gain". He had 2 months service with Capt. Wheeler in 1775. He was paid 16 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Moore, Elijah, Private, (8/6/1735–11/15/1792), age 56. He married Sarah Goodenow and had 4 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co. He was paid 10 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Moore, Ephraim, Private, (11/27/1751–6/11/1835), age 84. He married Ann Knight and had 6 children. His epitaph at one time read, "In memory of Mr. Ephraim Moore, who died June 11, 1835; AEt. 84". He was in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 45 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Moore, Hezekiah, Matross, (9/13/1696–1/9/1784), age 88. He was married to Mary Haynes and had 9 children. His epitaph is unknown. He had 8 months service stationed at Governor's Island, New York Harbor in Col. Crafts' Artillery Regiment.

Moore, Israel, Captain, (11/18/1724–8/12/1799), age 75. He married Susanna Woodward and had 8 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 102 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Moore, Ruben Jr., Private, (?/?/1728–2/19/1808), age 80. He married Mary Bowker and had no known children. His epitaph is unknown. He enlisted for 3 Years in 1777 in the Continental Army.

Moore, Uriah, Lieutenant, (1/5/1751–6/25/1799), age 47. He married Olive Howe and had 1 child. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Lieutenant Uriah Moore, who died June 25, 1799. AEt. 47 years & 5 months". He enlisted for 3 Years in 1777 in Col. How's 4th Regiment. He was paid 58 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Moore, William, Sargent, (10/12/1747–3/29/1836), age 89. He married Abigail Wheeler and had 8 children. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Mr. William Moore, who died March 29, 1836, aged 89". He marched on April 19, 1775. He was paid 71 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Noyes, Daniel Jr., Lieutenant, (3/30/1698–12/29/1781), age 83. He married Sara Haynes who had no known children. He then married Sara Gott and had 11 children. His epitaph reads, "Memento mori. In memory of Lieutenant Daniel Noyes, who departed this life December 29th, 1781, Aged 83 years, 8 months & 14 days". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co., Col. Reed's Regiment in the Canada Expedition in 1776. He was paid 55 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Noyes, Oliver, Lieutenant, (7/22/1738–2/26/1803), age 65. He was married to Rachel Johnson and had 4 children. His epitaph reads, "Here lies deposited all that was mortal of Deacon Oliver Noyes. He departed this life February 26th, 1803: AEtatis 65". He was in in Capt. Wheeler's Co. and marched on April 19, 1775. He was paid 81 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Parmenter, Abel, Private, (7/7/1754-9/10/1839), age 85. He married Rebeckah Berry and had 4 children. His epitaph reads, "Mr. Abel Parmenter died September 10, 1839. AEt. 85". He was at Bunker Hill and had 2 months enlistment in Capt. Hayward's Co., Col. Thatcher's Regiment Jan thru Feb 1777. He was paid 17 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Parmenter, Ebenezer, Private. (12/25/1761–3/18/1851), age 89. He married Sarah Haynes and had no known children. He then married Anna Wheeler and had 5 children. His epitaph reads, "Mr. Ebenezer Parmenter died March 18, 1851, AEt. 89". He was on the pension rolls for both the Continental Line and the Militia. He was in Capt. Jacob Haskins's Co., Col. John Jacobs's Regiment. He enlisted July 1, 1778, and was in service, 6 months, 4 days, at Rhode Island,

Parmenter, Edmund, Private, (1/30/1716–12/27/1792), age 76. He married Milecent Rice and had 2 children. He then married Sarah Kendall and had 3 children. His epitaph at one time read, "In memory of Mr. Edmund Parmenter, who died December 27th, 1792; aged 76 years". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co. He was paid 50 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Parmenter, James Jr., Private, (1/15/1753–2/22/1828), age 75. He married Esther Marshall and had 8 children. His epitaph at one time read, "In memory of Mr. James Parmenter, who died February 22, 1828; AEt. 75 years". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co. He was paid 30 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Parmenter, William Jr., Private, (6/5/1754–7/7/1812), age 60. He married Dolly Hager and had no known children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co. He was paid 48 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Parmenter, William, Private, (7/15/1719–3/28/1797), age 78. He married Mary Pepper and had 4 children. He was in Capt. Rice's Co. His epitaph is unknown. He was paid 9 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Plympton, Ebenezer, Private, (7/4/1756–12/9/1834), age 78. He married Susannah Ruggles and had 1 child. His epitaph at one time read, "Ebenezer Plympton ESQ only son of Thomas Plympton ESQ and great grandson of Thomas the elder was born in Sudbury July 4, 1756, and died Dec 9 1834 aged 78". He had 2 Months service with Capt. Wheeler in 1775.

Plympton, Thomas, Private. (4/17/1723–8/6/1789), age 67. He married Ruth Thomas and had 2 children. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Thomas Plympton Esquire, who departed this life August 6th 1789 in the 67th year of his age". He was in in Capt. Wheeler's Co. and marched on April 19, 1775. He was paid 86 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Puffer, Daniel, Private, (1/2/1745–3/13/1829), age 83. He married Mary Balcom and had 6 children. He then married Jerusha Brentnall and had no known children. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Mr. Daniel Puffer, who died March 13, 1829, AEt. 83". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co.. He was paid 32 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Puffer, Isaac, Private, (6/10/1744–1/19/1825), age 80. He married Sarah Whelor and had no known children. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of Mr. Isaac Puffer, who died January 19, 1825 AEt. 80 years & 7 months". He was in in Capt. Wheeler's Co. and marched on April 19, 1775. He was paid 32 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Puffer, Jabez, Captain, (10/26/1705–6/21/1789), age 85. He married Thankful Haynes and had 3 children. He then married Hannah Treadway and had 8 children. He then married Sarah Perry and had no known children. His epitaph reads, "Here lies in hope of a resurrection the mortal part of Capt. Jabez Puffer, who departed this life June 21st AD 1789 in the 85th year of his age. My flesh shall slumber in the ground Till the last trumpet's joyful sound. Then burst the chains without surprise And in my Saviour's image rise". He served in the French and Indian Wars, as a private in Capt. Josiah Brown's Co., in 1739 and as ensign in Capt. Josiah Richardson's Co., in 1757. He was Captain of The Alarm Company during the revolution which was comprised of older men not required to train but expected to turn out in an emergency.

Puffer, James, Lieutenant, (8/11/1734–3/8/1814), age 80. He married Mary Dakin and had 3 children. He then married Submit Goddard and had 1 child. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co. and marched on April 19, 1775. He was paid 73 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Puffer, Samuel, Captain, (5/3/1735-5/24/1811), age 76. He was married to Olive Rice and had 1 child. His epitaph reads. "Erected in memory of Captain Samuel Puffer, who died May 24, 1811. AEt. 76". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co. and marched on April 19, 1775. He was paid 65 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Puffer, Silas, Captain, (5/27/1762–5/29/1828), age 66. He married Sarah Willis and had 7 children, His epitaph at one time read, "In memory of Captain Silas Puffer, who died May 29, 1828: AEt. 66". He was in Capt. Bowker's Co., Col. Webb's Regiment.

Puffer, Thomas, Private, (8/13/1741–6/20/1796), age 55. He had no known wife. His epitaph at one time read, "In memory of Mr. Thomas Puffer who died June 20 1796 aged 55". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co. and marched on April 19, 1775. He was paid 52 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Reed, Asahel, Private, (3/20/1753–4/19/1775), age 22. He had no known wife. He was killed near Hartwell's Tavern, Lincoln on April 19, 1775, and his body was brought to the cemetery. His location in the cemetery is unknown.

Reed, Jacob, Private, (7/21/1758–11/15/1795), age 37. He married Betty Gleason and had 6 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was stationed at Hull, then at Fort Independence. He was in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 76 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Reed, Joseph, Private, (11/15/1733–1/17/1809), age 76. He had no known wife. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co. He was paid 27 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Rice, Benjamin, Private, (4/13/1754–3/8/1835), age 83. He was married to Lucy Smith and had 7 children. His epitaph at one time read, "Mr. Benjamin Rice died suddenly March 8, 1835 AEt. 83". He joined Capt. Amasa Cranston's co. in 1776. He was at White Plains where he was reported as having lost articles in battle.

Rice, Jonathan, Colonel, (4/18/1740–2/1/1829), age 88. He had no known wife. His epitaph reads, "In Memory of Colonel Jonathan Rice, who died February 1, 1829, AEt. 88". He marched on April 19, 1775. He was on the Ticonderoga Campaign in 1776. He was also in Capt. Edgell's Co, Col. Brewer's Regiment that went to Saratoga, July 1777, and in Col. Brown's Regiment, Gen. Gates' Commander, as a Captain. He was paid 95 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Rice, Reuben, Lieutenant, (8/26/1757–11/13/1801), age 45. He was married to Ruth Bent and had 3 children. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of Lieutenant Reuben Rice who died November 13, 1801, Aged 45 years". He was in Capt. Daniel Grout's Co., Col. Enoch Hallett's Regiment. He enlisted Aug. 1, 1780 and was discharged Oct. 30, 1780. The regiment was raised to reinforce Continental Army for 3 months.

Rice, William, Clerk, (11/12/1737–12/5/1819), age 82. He married Sarah Noyes and had 8 children. His epitaph reads, "Erected in memory of William Rice Esq., who died December 5, 1819; AEt. 82". Rice was Clerk to the Assistant Commissary of Issues at the government magazine at Sudbury. After the war, he was employed as a Magistrate who represented Sudbury for several years in General Court (the Massachusetts Legislature). He was paid 70 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Richardson, Josiah Jr., Private, (5/27/1733–5/8/1824), age 90. He was married to Elizabeth Eveleth and had 1 child. His epitaph reads, "REVOLUTIONARY WAR MAY 27, 1733- MAY 8, 1824 ELISABETH EVELETH HIS WIFE FEB 12, 1735- OCT. 6, 1825." His original stone that is now missing once read, "Josiah Richardson a soldier in the Revolution Died May 8, 1824, aged 90 years". He was in Capt. Rice's Co. and marched on April 19, 1775. He was paid 75 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Robinson, Jonathan, Private, (?/?/1720-2/24/1793), age 73. He married Hannah Capron and had 1 child. His epitaph is unknown. He enlisted in 1777 for 3 years.

Smith, Amos, Private, (1/21/1699-9/5/1786), age 87. He married Susannah Holman and had 5 children. His epitaph at one time read, "Amos Smith, son of Thomas & Abigail Smith, born Jan. 21, 1699, died Sept. 5, 1786". He was in Capt. Allen's Co., Col. Wigglesworth's Regiment.

Smith, Benjamin, Corporal, (10/29/1741-7/2/1819), age 78. He married Lucy Maynard and had 10 children. His epitaph at one time read, "Benjamin Smith, son of Amos and Susannah Smith, born October 29, 1741, died July 2, 1819". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co. and marched on April 19, 1775. He was paid 52 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Smith, Elijah, Private, (4/14/1717-10/15/1799), age 82. He married Abigail Plympton and had 3 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co. He was paid 52 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Smith, Henry, Private, (4/24/1724-8/9/1804), age 81. He married Lucretia Moore and had 9 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Hayne's Co. of militia, which marched on the alarm of April 19, 1775 to Cambridge. His service was for 3 days.

Smith, Israel, Lieutenant, (?/?/1766-5/3/1802), age 42. He married Persis Haynes and had no known children. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Lieutenant Israel Smith, who died May 3, 1802; AEtatis 42". He was one of the men raised to guard the government stores at Sudbury. His service there was for 3 Months. He was also in Capt. Cranston's Co., Col. Denny's Regiment which was raised for 3 months.

Smith, Jonathan, Private, (7/16/1744-8/1/1822), age 78. He married Ann Willis and had 6 children. His epitaph at one time read, "Erected in Memory of Mr. Jonathan Smith, who died August 1, 1822. AEt. 78". He is listed in the Sudbury muster roll in Capt. Wheeler's Co.. He was paid 49 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Smith, Thomas, Private, (5/2/1756-1/2/1837), age 81. He married Mary Haynes and had 2 children. His epitaph at one time read, "Thomas Smith died Jan. 2, 1837, AEt.81". He had 2 months service with Capt. Wheeler in 1775.

Stone, John, Private, (2/11/1757-8/18/1844), age 88. He married Ann Hunt and had 9 children. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Mr. John Stone died August 18, 1844, aged 88 years and 6 months. Erected by his son, William Stone". He marched on April 19, 1775. He was then stationed at Governor's Island, New York Harbor in 1776 for 8 months.

Stone, Moses, Private, (6/21/1734-11/27/1804), age 70. He married Hannah Moore and had 4 children. His epitaph is unknown. He marched on April 19, 1775 in Capt. Wheeler's Co. He was paid 50 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Thayer, Zephaniah, Private, (7/15/1736-2/11/1818), age 81. He married Prudence Loomis and had 10 children. His epitaph at one time read, "Dea. Zephaniah Thayer died 11 February 1818, AEt. 81". He was in Capt. Abijah Savage's Co., Col. Henry Sherburne's Regiment. He enlisted May 1, 1777 for 3 years.

Thompson, Abel, Captain, (1755-6/21/1811), age 55. He had no known wife. His epitaph is unknown. He was a Private at Bunker Hill. He then enlisted in Col. How's 4th Regiment for 3 years. He was paid 75 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Thompson, James, Private, (1727-3/21/1812), age 85. He had no known wife. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 41 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Tower, Ambrose, Private, (1727-4/1/1788), age 61. He married Jerusha Clap and had 8 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co.. He was paid 132 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Tower, Benjamin, Private, (1/25/1738-7/24/1790), age 56. He married Ann Vorce and had 8 children. His epitaph is unknown. He enlisted in Col. How's 4th Regiment for 3 years.

Wheeler, Asahel, Captain, (3/1/1741-10/28/1822), age 81. He married Thankful Goodenow and had 6 children. He then married Jerusha Haynes and had another 6 children. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Captain Asahel Wheeler, an officer in the Revolution, Died October 28, 1822, aged 81 years". He served 2 months in 1775. He was paid 83 Pounds by the town in 1773 for his war service.

Wheeler, Elisha, Lieutenant, (2/1/1710 - 7/17/1785) age 75. He married Mary Loring and had 14 children. His epitaph is unknown. He marched on April 19, 1775 in Capt. Moses Stone's co., in a regiment commanded by Col. Ezekiel How, service, 2 days ; reported as having left the company without proper dismissal.

Wheeler, Israel, Private, (1/17/1745-12/13/1830), age 86. He married Lucy Ingersoll and had 9 children. He then married Susanna Carter and had no known children. His epitaph reads, "Israel Wheeler, died December 13, 1830, AEt. 86". He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co.. He was paid 50 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Wheeler, Jonas, Private, (2/23/1755-1849), age 94. He married Lucretia Smith and had 1 child. His epitaph is unknown. He marched on April 19, 1775 in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 18 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Willis, Elijah, Sargent, (1742-8/29/1775), age 33. He married Hannah Taylor and had 1 child. His epitaph reads, "This stone erected by Mrs. Hannah Willis to the Memory of her much respected husband Sergeant Elijah Willis who died August 29 1775 in the 33rd year of his age". He was wounded at Bunker Hill, and he died in a hospital in Boston. He was in Capt. Nixon's Co.. His Executor was paid 10 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Willis, Hopestill, Lieutenant. (1/19/1747-3/14/1823), age 76. He married Olive Smith and had 6 children. His epitaph reads, "Hopestill Willis died March 14, 1823. aged 76". He marched on April 19, 1775 in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 73 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Willis, Jesse, Drummer, (1/8/1730-2/28/1805), age 74. He married Eunice Daby and had 7 children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Wheeler's Co.. He was paid 32 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Willis, Reuben, Private, (6/9/1738-8/8/1791), age 54. He married Sarah Brigham and had 1 child. His epitaph reads, "In memory of Mr. Reuben Willis who died August 8 1791 aged 54 years". He was in Capt. Rice's Co.. He was paid 48 Pounds by the town in 1778 for his war service.

Willis, Samuel, Private, (?/?/?-1/30/1778), age 58. He married Sybill Balcom and had no known children. His epitaph is unknown. He was in Capt. Bowker's Co., Col. Webb's Regiment.
